<p>1. About 10 PM on the night of 10 Jul 52, while enroute from Leningrad to Moscow by train, we saw a bright light in the air which was trailed by a long tail of black smoke. It was much too bright for a plane. It may have been five to 15 miles distant and was under two thousand feet above ground.</p> <p>2. We informed of our guide what it was but got only a harrumph reply that it was probably a flying saucer. The guide was "Tsvetov" who had been with a party of which I was a member on a previous trip.
