Reporting of Oil Spill-Related Illnesses and Injuries to the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals

The Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals' Office of Public Health, Section of Environmental Epidemiology and Toxicology (OPH/SEET) is tracking and evaluating all acute health effects related to the BP Oil Spill. Potential complaints include exposure to odors/fumes, skin contact with contaminated water or objects, heat stress, in addition to injuries such as lacerations/fractures resulting from clean up or containment activities. All patients treated for an oil spill-related injury or illness should be reported to OPH/SEET as soon as possible. This information is critical to state agencies monitoring the health impact of the oil spill on Louisiana residents and workers.

What to report:

Patient name and contact information, name of reporting facility, name and telephone number of person reporting event, and brief description of health complaint and treatment. OPH/SEET will follow-up if more information is needed.

How to report:

Reporting may be done by telephone, email or fax. Please use the telephone hotline for afterhours and weekend reporting.

HIPAA Compliance OPH/SEET is conducting surveillance in its capacity as a public health authority as defined by the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information; Final Rule (Privacy Rule) [45 CFR § 164.501]. Pursuant to 45 CFR § 164.512(b) of the Privacy Rule, healthcare providers may disclose, without individual authorization, protected health information to public health authorities "...authorized by law to collect or receive such information for the purpose of preventing or controlling disease, injury, or disability, including, but not limited to, the reporting of disease, injury, vital events such as birth or death, and the conduct of public health surveillance, public health investigations, and public health interventions..."
