

Dedication

To a man who has spent more than half a century in his chosen field, forty-one of those on college campuses as Dean, the 1954-55 Pedagog is most respectfully dedicated.

It is fitting that this edition of the yearbook honor Dean Henry E. Speck, Dean of Men on the Southwest Texas State Teachers College campus for the past thirty-one years, for at the end of the summer session Dean Speck will retire from active service with the College.

His departure is, however, a physical one only, for the effect of the Dean's friendly smile and his stable progressive leadership can not be erased from the minds of his students, friends, and colleagues.


Dean Speck began his career in the field of teaching with a job near Packsaddle Mountain in 1904, earning \$35 a month of which \$7 went for room and board. He taught at several other schools before going to Abilene Christian College in 1913. He became Dean of the College at ACC in 1914. It was a fortunate occasion that brought Dean Speck to the Southwest Texas campus in 1924.

Aside from his duties as director of men students on the Hill, Dean Speck has continued to teach mathematics classes, has sponsored the yearbook and newspaper several times as well as a number of other College activities, and has taken an active role in religious activities both on and off the campus.

Recognized as a minister in the Church of Christ since 1914, Dean Speck has supplied many pulpits over the state since that time. In partial recognition for his religious interest as well as his services as an educator, he was chosen to deliver the sermon at the 1954 Spring Baccalaureate Services.








College Infirmary Treats Hill Students for Ailments

With its quiet corridors and its cheerful rooms the College Infirmary is the haven of refuge for all "ailing" Hillites.



Student Counselors Help Frosh Adjust To Hill Life

Although the initial duty of the student counselor is to greet and make comfortable the new girl coming to SWTSTC, her duties are really much broader and actually begin early in the summer months.

Each prospective transfer student or freshman is written a letter of introduction by one of the student counselors. By the time the summer is over, the new girl knows at least one person well and has a much better idea of what to expect of her new life at college.

The student counselor is on duty 24 hours a day. She is available night and day for counseling and advice. A "mother hen" for the whole year to her group of "chicks," the counselor encourages the new student to engage in extra-curricular activities, answers questions about clothes, boys, dates, studying, and so forth. The counselor is looked upon as a slightly more experienced friend and not as a source of discipline or example.

The student counselor takes a course in counseling in the Spring semester of each year. From this group are chosen the girls specifically designated as counselors (or advisors in upper classman dorms) for the following year.

Once there they gathered around a big bonfire, roasted wieners, played games, and sang songs. Various groups from the base entertained with songs and dances.







A meeting of these students was held in the Sun Room of the Student Union so that they could meet the persons responsible for their award.






Air-Conditioned Library Makes Studying Easier


Home Economic Students Gain Painting Experience




Jowers Selected to Coach High School Hoop Stars












The Shakespeare Literary Society, oldest girls' club on the Hill, once again sponsored the annual football banquet and dance.


THE SCRIP




Buzzy Allert, SWT tackle, was named to Williamson's system All-American team of 1954.

To wind up his football career at San Marcos, Buzzy was showered with selections on the First Team All-Texas College and the First Team All-LSC.




Buzzy Allert and Gene Hanks discuss strategy for next game. Allert and Hanks played together at Gonzales High School where they were star backfield men.

OUTSTANDING BOBCATS








POWERFUL TRINITY UPHEELS CATS, 26-7

Texas' only unbeaten college, Trinity University, pounded the Bobcats in San Marcos for the second straight year, 26-7. A deadly passing attack engineered by T-quarterback Beal guided the Tigers to 226 yards in the air, and stunned the Felines for the second week.

SWT missed a scoring opportunity just before the half when a fourth-down pass was intercepted in the end zone, and the Bobcats were not to crash the points column until the last period, with Trinity already ahead 26-0.


Don Roberson scored the Cat touchdown on a late two-yard plunge and Graham kicked the point.




Herbert Hill was a versatile performer in the strong Bobcat torward wall.

A 38-yard scoring run by Schmeltekopf in the third quarter put the Bobcats back in the ballgame, and big Ed plunged one yard early in the last stanza for another touchdown. Graham booted conversions after the two scored, and made one himself on a 24-yard last-period romp.

Gene Smith and Gene Hanks turned in outstanding performances in the Bobcat line.


RUGGED YELLOWJACKETS CLIP BOBCATS 28-13


The first period of play found the teams waging a 7-7 battle, but Howard Payne tallied again in the second stanza to assume a lead held the rest of the way.

Steve Curry went one yard and Kenneth Wilhite shook loose on a 91-yard scoring jaunt to put the Javs in front at the intermission. In the third quarter SWT's Donald Roberson went over twice and Bobby Graham and Bobby Gibbens toed conversions which gave the visitors a 14-13 edge.

A&I took the lead again on a field goal by S. T. Bridges before Southwest Texas climaxed a sterling effort with the winning touchdown. John Faseler rushed in from his end post to block and recover an A&I punt in the end zone.


CATS DISPLAY POWER, ROMP SUL ROSS, 33-13

Southwest Texas turned on its biggest offensive blast of the season to whip visiting Sul Ross at Evans Field, 33-13, for a second straight LSC victory.

Bob McBride engineered a vicious Cat offense, scoring twice and setting up another touchdown with a 49-yard kickoff return. SWT went ahead on a McBride sneak in the first period, 7-0, and led at halftime by 20-0, following sneaks by Sammy Howard and McBride, again from two yards out, and Bobby Gibbens' two conversions.

In the third period sturdy Keith Hoffman plowed across for a 26-0 Cat edge, and Bobby Gibbens twisted 31 yards for the finale in the fourth period. Leon Sefton toed the PAT for a 33-0 edge.

Sul Ross hammered back for two scores by all-conference back Norman Cash from short yardage away to narrow the count. Herb Carleston, Buzzy Allert, Gene Smith, and Gene Hanks were key men in the line for SWT.





Bob McBride handed off to Ed Schmeltekopf on a straight power plunge from two yards out and Schmeltekopf, finding no hole, lateralled back to Mc-Bride, who found paydirt around the right side. Bobby Graham kicked what proved to be the winning point.


Stephen F. Austin went 80-yards on a lastperiod drive for their only score of the game, Bailey Marshall crashing over from the two. The PAT attempt was wide, however, leaving the Bobcats ahead. SWT had a 200-44 edge in rushing yardage, and SFA led in passing, 136-92. The game was marked by fine line play by both squads.

HANKS BLOCKS KICK; CATS WIN GAME 13-12

Steady Gene Hanks broke through the line to block the tying point-after-touchdown attempt as the Southwest Texas squad won their Homecoming tilt from Lamar Tech, 13-12.

In a thriller all the way until the finish, SWT compiled a 7-6 first-period edge, and maintained the one-point advantage the rest of the way. Bob McBride hit end Dave Rutherford with a scoring pass for the Bobcat score, after Lamar's Raymond Meyer found Tech end, Gene Powell, in the end zone for an early Cardinal lead. Ed Schmeltekopf kicked the deciding point after.

McBride scored himself in the third period from the one-yard line, after a brilliant catch by end, Charlie Hall, on a 27-yard pass play. Lamar scored in the last quarter after a fumble recovery on the SWT 15, with Sammy Carpenter going over from the four, but Hanks foiled the tying effort by the Cards.





CATS TAKE THRILLER, DEFEAT SAM HOUSTON

Refusing to be beaten, the Bobcats traveled to Huntsville to win a breath-taking, 26-22, thriller from strong Sam Houston's Bearkats.

The lead changed hands five times in the LSC battle, with Southwest Texas scoring first on a 62-yard pass interception-runback by the sparkling McBride. Sam Houston tied the game shortly afterward, but a 53-yard SWT march capped by Ed Schmeltekopf's two-yarder and conversion put the visiting Felines ahead again, 13-6.

Stan Keathley of the Bearkats hit teammate Richard Davis with a scoring aerial in the second period, and Allen Boren toed a 12-yard field goal to give the 'Kats a 15-13 halftime edge.

Don Roberson broke loose for 44 yards and another Cat score in the third period, giving the SWT eleven a 19-15 margin at the threequarter mark. Benny Boles of SHS went 14 in the fourth period for a 22-19 Sam Houston lead, but a late 67-yard Bobcat drive, capped by Keith Hoffman's eight-yard dash, brought victory to the Southwest Texans.

SAN MARCANS TIE FOR LSC CROWN


Southwest Texas climaxed a 6-3-1 season with co-championship in the Lone Star Conference, battling defending titlest East Texas to a 7-7 tie in Commerce.

The first half was all Southwest Texas, but the second part of the ballgame was a different story. The determined Cats scored on the last play of the first quarter on a 15-yard Bob Mc-Bride-to-John-Faseler aerial, capping a 42-yard drive, and Ed Schmeltekopf toed the extra point.

Time and time again the Bobcats threatened without going across in the first half, and the intermission arrived with SWT still holding the 7-0 advantage.

Following the half the East Texans came back in force, scoring after an intercepted pass gave them the ball in Cat territory midway of the third period. Six plays sent the ball across, Gene Marshall carrying over from the two. Bobby Fox kicked the conversion that settled the LSC title between the Lions and Cats, 7-7.






Bobby Gibbens rotated between the backfield and end, nevertheless, he was an outstanding player.

BOBCATS TIE FOR LSC CAGE TITLE

Southwest Texas' surprising quintet grabbed the school's second Lone Star Conference title share in the midst of the loop's most hectic race in years. Both clubs had tied in football.

Both the Bobcats and East Texas State finished with 9-3 conference marks, to again enter the winner's circle together. The two clubs met at Waco in a playoff for the loop's NAIA tournament spot, and East Texas claimed a sizzling 86-83 decision to end the SWT slate for 1955.

Billed as the third-rated team in conference play prior to the season's opening Southwest began their schedule with a 74-72 upset of BAMC and went on to compile a record of 20 victories and five defeats, scoring 1982 points for an average of 79.2 per tilt. Opponents tallied 1653 for a 66.1 average.

Top individual performance was turned in by Bill Banks, the 6-8 post star who twice scored 39 points in a single contest. The big hookshot artist led scorers with 501 points in the 23 official tilts, an average of 21.7 points per contest. Not far behind was left-handed push shot star Lefty Peery, whose 495 points in season play netted a 21.5 average. Peery's top effort was 35 tallies in one game.

Other outstanding work was turned in by centers Herb Billings and Joe Cole and guards Aubrey Horner, Bobby Roberts, Bill Krueger, and Duane Vincent, who alternated starting positions.


Milton Jowers' team broke 100 points once, against Howard Payne, and five more times broke 95 in the scoring column. Longest winning streak stretched from January 8 to January 31, seven games. The Bobcats were never defeated at home during the course of the season, winning 12 straight ball games in San Marcos.

Banks, Peery, Billings, Melford Turner, and Roy Jackson ended their varsity careers for the Bobcat team.




Bill Banks gets a helpful shove as he lays the ball up and through the net for two counters.

SWT Splits With Sul Ross




Felines Top Lumberjacks


Earlier, Southwest Texas had outscored the SFA crew in a 78-67 battle in San Marcos.

BILL BANKS: Senior Center




Banks goes high for rebound and tip-in try against his opponents. Peery comes in to help make play.


Cats Split With Lamar


Roy Jackson arches one toward the basket for two markers.

East Texas Wins, Loses





Bobcats Bump Javs Twice






Joe Cole reaches up for the tip. His jumping opponent doesn't seem to be getting off the floor.











Following football came basketball. Competition was strong and spirits raged high throughout the hoop season.


Handball, volleyball, and softball completed the intramural program during the Spring Semester. Prizes were awarded to the winning teams.










Frontier Days Celebration Held at Sewell, Campsite






1954 Homecoming Includes Parade, Ball Game, Dance








