




Message from the AACS President



A Farewell Message from Peter Chow



Dear AACCS Members :

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your engagement and support of the AACCS, and to me as its Executive Director in the past years. The annual conference has become an important venue of brainstorming sessions of our professional activities, in addition to the reunion of our friendship and knowing new friends.

In the mid-1980s, I attended the AACCS conference as a junior and found it was very rewarding to me. Since then, I participated in most of its annual conferences and got to know more and more prominent scholars in various disciplines. In 1998, the AACCS board appointed me as the Executive Director and invited my university to host the 40th annual conference in New York City. It was a productive conference with Nobel Laureate in economics, Prof. Lawrence Klein as the keynote speaker, further enhancing the visibility of the organization.

In nearly two and half decades, the AACCS has become an internationally recognized academic organization devoted to the study of China and Taiwan as stipulated in Article 2 of its constitution. In many years, our annual conference program is well balanced in all disciplines on pertinent subjects, and with a great diversity of its participants from all over the world. The credit goes to the contribution of the Program Committee under various program chairs and committee members. The governance structure of the organization is well institutionalized under the constitution. With the leadership of its Executive Board, its president, and vice president, I have been able to work smoothly with more than a dozen of presidents, vice presidents, and different components of the executive board to accomplish as much as we had anticipated.

Travel fund for the professional conference is not available for graduate students in all universities. Given the budget constraint, I still implemented a travel grant for junior scholars whose home institutions can not fund their trip to the AACCS conference. Many of those travel grant recipients turn out to become the loyal AACCS members attending the annual conference year after year. Some of them became well established and were recruited to become AACCS board members as well.

It was reported that there are about 70 Asian study programs scattered around the high education institutions in the States. I worked with nearly one-third of them in managing our annual conference in the past years. The AACCS has become a platform of academic exchanges in the field study. The ripple effect of our annual conference on Asian study is immeasurable as some hosting institutions expressed to me. The dissemination of research output from our members became a good stock of knowledge and an important asset in the field. Of course, there is always room for further improvement. But it really fulfills the functions of promoting communication and understanding among scholars from all parts of the world as indicated in the AACCS constitution.

For its next chapter of dynamic growth, the AACCS would need new blood in its leadership. Many of you know that I announced my intention of retiring from the AACCS Executive Director at the 60th annual conference held at the University of Maryland School of Law in 2018. Through a not-so essay search process, the AACCS board appointed Professor Abraham Hong Jen Lin as the next AACCS Executive Director. With all those cheerful experiences and my deep appreciation for all of you, I happily pass the duty of Executive Director to Professor Lin. Please continue to support the organization and help him to serve our organization.
